Current Edison Funding Situation

Statement of Support from the Neighborhood by Kari Parsons

Continuing reductions to public education operating budgets are taking their toll on 4J schools. At our neighborhood school, Edison Elementary, the budget for the 2013-14 school year leaves Edison short one teacher and down many hours of critical Instructional Assistant (IA) time. This is sobering news. The result is that if we want to avoid blended grades and even larger class sizes, Edison's fundraising dollars that previously went to support physical education and music instruction will now be needed to ensure each classroom has a teacher and that we have basic instructional supports.

Over \$120,000 is needed to maintain the current level of teaching and instructional assistants (to say nothing of PE and music). Edison parent fundraising has never cracked the \$100,000 mark before and we are coming into our last, but most favorite, fundraiser below our



typical numbers. This is where you, our amazing neighborhood supporters, come in. On May 17, Edison will hold its 33rd Annual Jog-a-Thon. We could run those kids around the track until they collapse, or we can count on you to increase your support this year. You can contribute a flat amount on the Edison website using PayPal or, when your local Edison student knocks on your door, you can pledge per mile or

give a flat amount. Please, please give generously. The stakes are high. Edison will only remain a thriving, soughtafter anchor for our neighborhood if we can continue to offer the comprehensive educational experience we think children should have – and this year in particular we need bountiful fundraising to be able to do that.

We love the Edison Jog-a-Thon because it is student-led, community-supported, and just plain fun. Our students raised \$33,000 last year and with your help we'll raise \$44,000 this year. We may be behind the pack this year

UO Student Day of Service in Campus Neighborhoods

The lunch was catered by Qdoba.

From where I sit, it seems that 2013 has continued to be a time of both accomplishments and struggles for the neighborhood.

After several years of concerted effort, the City finally passed the Social Host Ordinance (now known by the Ordinance on Unruly Behavior). This already appears to be an important tool for dealing with the more severe instances of irresponsible and unlawful behavior on the part of a small number of residents.

Our enormous show of support for maintaining a small neighborhood elementary school within the center of our neighborhood contributed to the 4J decision to take off the table the idea of closing Edison. We are currently in conversation with the architecture firm which has been hired to study the various issues involved with both renovation and/or new construction for the Edison building.

At the same time the neighborhood continues to be faced with the construction of new rental properties from the single unit size (though still 5 bedrooms) to the enormous multi unit size. Unfortunately, we still seem to appear to be a gold mine in the eyes of developers. Efforts on all fronts continue to keep us engaged with the City, the University and neighborhood residents.

Venue Info - Hayward Field

At the heart of Eugene's successful bid for the 2008 and 2012 U.S. Olympic Track and Field Team Trials, Hayward Field looms as one of the world's most famous track and field venues.

In 2010, Track Town USA welcomed the NCAA Outdoor Championships for the 10th time since 1962 – the most of any venue in modern history. It's also the only facility to ever host three consecutive U.S. Olympic Trials (1972, 1976, 1980), while six U.S. Championships have graced the storied venue, including recent events in 1999, 2001, 2009 and 2011.

The centerpiece of 'Track Town, USA,' Hayward Field attracts athletes, coaches and fans from thousands of miles away because of its renowned crowds well-versed in the sport and ready to roar in approval. Hayward Field's historic, covered grandstands are equally beloved, and comparable to many famous European venues. The 'Carnegie Hall' for American track and field plays host annually to the nation's finest single-day track and field contest, the Prefontaine Classic, which features the top mix of national and international talent on American soil each year.

Oregon's fabled track and field-only facility is named for the first of several legendary coaches, Bill Hayward, who guided the Oregon men's team from 1904-1947.

Hayward Field was initially constructed for football in 1919. Two years later, a six-lane cinder track was installed and a full schedule of track events were transferred from Kincaid Field on the opposite edge of campus. The facility was utilized for both sports until the opening of Autzen Stadium in 1967. The stadium (current capacity: 10,500) has undergone significant improvements in modern history, including a new track surface, permanent lights, a video board and newly configured infield.

In 2007, distance running fans celebrated a new permanent lighting system that was unveiled for the Oregon Invitational distance carnival. The grand venue can now easily accommodate the most televised hours of Olympic Trials coverage ever, thanks to eight, 110-foot light poles and an additional lighting system fixed to the top of west and east grandstands.

Powell Plaza – unveiled in 2005 to welcome fans into the fabled facility – details UO's rich track and field heritage and is named after the family of Lloyd Powell, a track teammate of former coach and athlete Bill Dellinger. That same year, the facility welcomed a new four-lane, fully-lit 400-meter all-weather track that encircles six new tennis courts on the southwest edge of the track.

Situated on the northwest corner of the facility, the \$2 million Bowerman Building was completed in 1992 and dedicated to Bill Bowerman and his family who donated funds necessary to construct the all-purpose building. The two-story, 15,000-square foot brick building houses the university's hailed

International Institute for Sport and Human Performance along with athletic treatment, locker rooms and meeting rooms. Memorabilia and various exhibits commemorate great athletes, teams and moments of the program's history.

Alder Street Pavement Preservation Project

Paving of Alder Street from the south side of E 18th Avenue to the north side of E 24th Avenue

Project Overview

- The street is showing significant deterioration, thus the existing pavement and base rock will be completely removed and replaced, or alternatively, recycled inplace and repayed, curb to curb.
- Sidewalk access ramps may be reconstructed at several locations.

Parks

- Summer 2013 playground surface renovation (going from sand to chips) at the University Park Playground.
- Summer 2013 road repair to the section of Fairmount that winds through Hendricks Park.
- The playground at Amazon Park will be completely renovated in 2014.

"What is most distinctive about...older neighborhoods is not the historic character of any particular house but the overall pattern of streets and alleys, the architectural coherence of housing stock, and the way that houses and streets work together to create a unique sense of community....

Anyone looking at housing in Eugene recognizes the value of these older neighborhoods. Although not everyone's ideal, they offer a

desirable housing option for many people, and for some they represent the most livable neighborhoods in the city. These neighborhoods are not necessarily historic but they are part of our city's history and are important to its identity....

As a matter of civic responsibility the city and its citizens should recognize the most coherent of these neighborhoods as cultural and physical artifacts and promote the understanding and preservation of them."

Update: SUNA Traffic Enhancement Project by Mike Westervelt

As I wrote in the last newsletter, Jeff Lanza and I spearheaded this project and secured a \$4,000 matching grant donation from the University of Oregon. This was a City of Eugene Matching Grant project, thus giving us a total of \$8,000.



This pilot project has almost been completed! We purchased hardware from Brandon Industries (similar to the photo at left). Brown Contracting Inc., of Eugene installed the footings and breakaway sections of the posts in late March. The remaining hardward (posts, signs, etc) are at the Traffic Department awaiting installation.

This project aims to not only find a more permanent solution to the issue of complete posts and signs being stolen but to be autify the neighborhood and

to provide a calming

effect on car, pedestrian and bike traffic. It will provide community building with the university, and benefit all others who use our neighborhood as a gateway to events at the UO.



This project will entail (10) posts/signs along the Alder corridor from 19th to 24th. A huge thank you to Karen Hyatt in UO Community Relations for making this a possibility.
